

LEARNING OUTCOME

- Learn about Grace Banu's story as a powerful example of self-advocacy and justice.
- Understand the barriers faced by transgender and marginalized children in education.
- Reflect on how institutions can change through persistence and courage.
- Explore the value of empathy, allyship, and creating space for all.
- Recognize that beneath differences of caste, gender, or identity, we share one common humanity.

LESSON PLAN

Through this story, students learn about the rights of every child to be seen, heard, and respected. Discussions will center around fairness, identity, and the power of asking brave questions.

Discussion Questions

Before Reading:

- Have you ever been treated unfairly? How did it make you feel?
- What does it mean to stand up for yourself or someone else?

During Reading:

- What questions does Grace ask?
- How do others treat her at school?
- What does she decide to do when things are unfair?

After Reading:

- What do you admire most about Grace?
- Why do you think it's hard for some children to go to school?
- How can we make our classroom a more welcoming place for everyone?

Activities:

- Grace's Questions Journal: Students write a question they have about fairness in their own life. Discuss how to explore answers together.
- Allyship Posters: Create posters about inclusion, kindness, and welcoming differences.
- Invisible No More: Draw a classroom where everyone—regardless of identity—is visible and celebrated.
- Mini Research: Identify another changemaker who challenged exclusion. Share what they achieved.
- Debate: "Should all schools have special policies for inclusion?"
