
Art is Everywhere – Here, There and in Food

Story Discussion Guide

After reading this story, children will be able to:

- Recognize artistic possibilities in ordinary food items.
- Practice careful observation and creative interpretation.
- Use food-based materials to create their own imaginative artwork.
- Begin to associate sustainability with creativity and respect for natural resources.

Lesson plan

TUsing the story's examples of food-inspired art, children will explore how creativity and observation can transform everyday items into imaginative visuals. They will create their own "food art" while learning to appreciate the world around them

Learning Outcome

Before Reading:

- What is the most interesting looking fruit or vegetable you've seen?
- Have you ever thought a food item looked like something else?

During Reading:

- What do the authors imagine with each food?
- What can make the foods look magical?

After Reading-

- Can you think of a food at home that could look like something else?
- What would you like to turn a banana peel or onion skin into?

Activities:

- Kitchen Creatures Art: Bring in real or illustrated food items. Ask children to turn them into imaginary animals or scenes using drawing or collage.
- Observation Challenge: Display various vegetables/fruits. Let students draw what they see and what they imagine.
- Food Sculpture Gallery: Using safe, non-perishable food items (or images), create a class art display.
- Rhyme It Like a Recipe: Ask children to write a short verse about their favorite food art.

Expected Outcomes

Children will develop the ability to observe with both their logical and imaginative minds.

They will see the world—even their lunch boxes—with new eyes. The story fosters wonder, creativity, and the joy of transforming the everyday into the extraordinary.
