


Oyisa and the Giant Tree

Story Discussion Guide

- Understand that small actions (like planting a seed) can grow into something big and beautiful.
- Appreciate how nature thrives when we nurture it.
- Learn patience and care through tending to plants.
- Begin to connect their own initiative of planting seeds to global values of caring for the earth.
- Recognize that children everywhere feel joy in helping life grow, building empathy and a sense of shared humanity (pluralism).

Lesson plan

Learning Outcome

Before Reading:

- Have you ever planted a seed or helped care for a plant?
- What do you think a seed needs to grow?
- How do you feel when you see something you cared for grow big and strong?

During Reading :

- Pause when Oyisa plants the seed: What do you think will happen next?
- Ask: Why does Oyisa care about this tiny seed?

After Reading:

- What helped Oyisa's seed grow?
- How did Oyisa feel when the tree got big?
- What can we do to take care of the plants and trees around us?
- How do you think kids in other parts of the world must feel when they grow something special?

Activities:

- Seed Jar Experiment: Plant seeds in a clear jar to watch roots grow.
- Patience Calendar: Track the plant's growth over time.
- Kindness Tree: Each child adds a leaf with a caring action they've done.

Expected Outcomes

- Value patience and nurturing.
- Develop early respect for nature and how small efforts grow into big impact.
- See that children everywhere share the same joy in caring for living things.

This links to sustainability and environmental respect, while also nurturing empathy for difference in all forms of life.
