
Indeed, there was fluffy white rice and soft and juicy chicken curry. They gobbled up the food, smacking their lips and licking their fingers. Even Norgay!

Just then, it started to drizzle!



"It tastes like tap water," said Iris.


"It tastes like nothing!" said Norgay.
