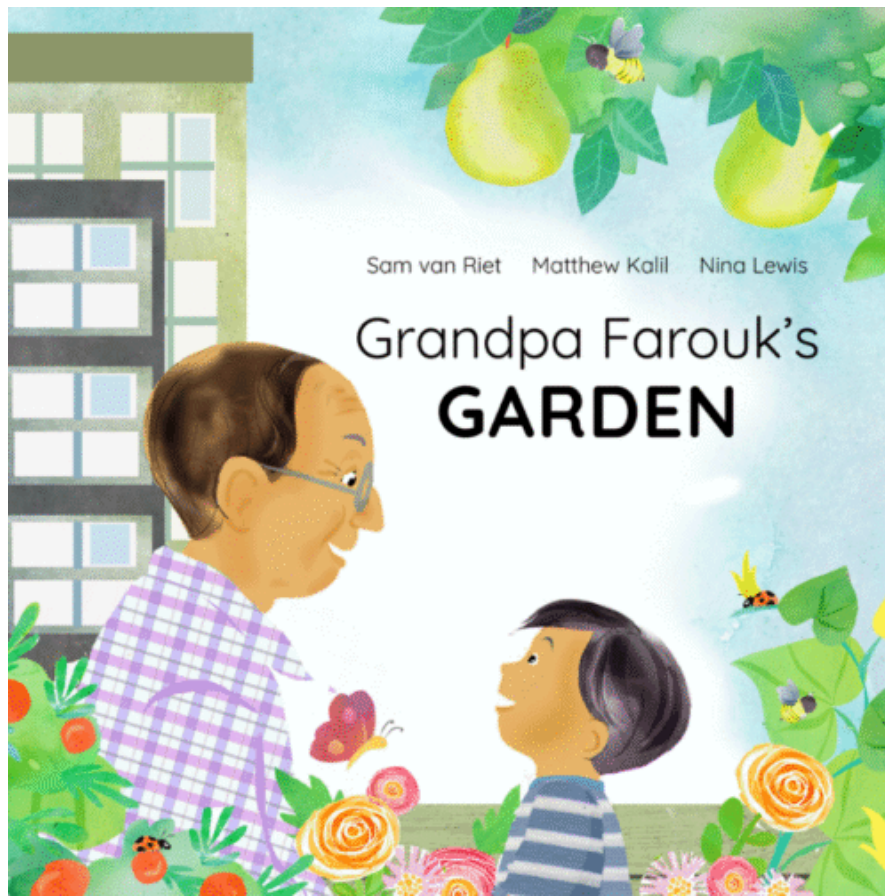


# Grandpa Farouk's Garden

# Story Discussion Guide

## Lesson plan

Introduce children to rooftop gardens and ask how plants grow in cities. Discuss how insects can help or harm plants.

## Learning Outcome

### Before Reading:

- Show pictures of rooftop gardens. Ask: “Have you ever planted something?”
- Introduce vocabulary: pests, compost, ladybird, blossom.

### During Reading :

- Pause when Amir searches for ladybirds. Ask: “What would you do to help the garden?”
- Observe Amir and Grandpa’s teamwork.

### After Reading :

- Discuss how natural helpers can support gardening.
- Draw a “garden hero” poster: ladybird, bee, or worm.

## Activities:

- Count and graph “ladybirds found.”
- Set up a seed jar and track growth.
- Make a simple compost bin for class/home.

## Expected Outcomes

- Learn about sustainable practices through urban gardening.
- Appreciate intergenerational knowledge-sharing.
- Understand the value of biodiversity in problem-solving.
- Recognize their role in caring for the Earth—no matter their age.
