Story Discussion Guide

- Learn about pottery as a traditional art and livelihood.
- Understand how cultural knowledge is passed down through generations.
- Appreciate the beauty and labor behind everyday handmade objects.
- Build curiosity about how things are made in different parts of the world

Lesson plan

This story can introduce children to traditional crafts, folk art, and intergenerational skill-building, highlighting pride in cultural work.

Learning Outcome

Before Reading:

- Have you ever seen someone make something with their hands?
- What do you know about pottery or clay work?
- Do you help your parents or grandparents with any tasks?

During Reading :

- What steps are involved in making a pot?
- How does Manu feel about learning from his father?
- What do the illustrations remind you of?

After Reading–

- What is something you've learned from a parent or grandparent?
- Why do you think making pots is both hard and joyful?
- What makes handmade things special?

Activities:

- Clay Craft Session: Let children shape a small pot or animal from clay or playdough.
- Folk Art Exploration: Introduce Madhubani art and have children color or design in similar style.
- My Family's Skills Chart: Children interview family members about skills/trades they know.
- Market Math: Create a role-play activity selling pots in a market and counting earnings.

Expected Outcomes

Children will build respect for cultural traditions and handmade crafts, recognize the skills behind everyday items, and feel pride in their own family's unique knowledge.
